Choosing to leave your country in search of a better life prospect is never easy: it leads to a journey that could be without return; it needs a strong motivation to stand the distance of the loved ones, the journey, the uncertainties; it takes money to pay for a ride.

No one leaves if where he lives there is the possibility of a peaceful life.

CEFA is present in so many peripheral realities and has always been trying to contrast the abandonment of the local land by offering to communities **opportunities for a change, in the form of self-development** (as our founder Giovanni Bersani would say).

We have always done it through projects that give people the dignity **to produce their own food**, to earn as much as necessary for the needs of the family, to live in an environment that respects man and democratic principles.

It is often said that migrations could be prevented by acting in the countries of origin, but this does not mean to build fences and creating ban to prevent people from leaving, sometimes to escape from inhumane situations. **It means to give the possibility to choose, to find in their territory the means to live fully.** It is a task we have been pursuing for over forty years and in which we continue to believe because the results are tangible and give us the strength to continue.

FROM EMERGENCY TO RECEPTION

The twenty-first century has often been referred to as “the century of exodus”.

To be honest the phenomenon has always existed and has always involved people around the world, Italian immigrants, before many others. Today migrations depend on many factors such as wars, climate change, poverty and lack of prospects. These are the same reasons that led our fellow countrymen to look for luck in Latin America, Europe, the United States and Australia in the last century (and even today). **We are not facing an unmanageable emergency**; we just need to find the tools needed to cope with an expected and predictable phenomenon.

CEFA supports the social and economic growth of populations in their own land, but taking into consideration the changing geopolitical conditions, it would have been irresponsible not to work on the reception of migrants, both in our country and in transit countries where we already operate.

- Therefore in Italy, CEFA has started educational training in schools, between citizens and workers, to provide the correct perception of the stories of immigrants and the duty of **welcoming and exchange** which leads to the **enrichment** of a country and not to its decline. To do this, we have collaborated with the Italian cooperative and association system, which has allowed us to arrive where problems arise (schools, welcome centres, workplaces, squares).

- Meanwhile, abroad, we have faced the fact that changes in world conditions have produced changes in migratory routes. For example, Libyan instability has transformed **Morocco from a country of emigration into a country of immigration**, but both civil society and Moroccan institutions cannot deal with the problem sufficiently, because they have no experience in this regard. Since 2011 CEFA has been working in training associations, media, teachers and people on the culture of reception.

This Welcome concerns both sub-Saharan and Moroccan migrants and many of these last ones, due to the crisis that struck Europe in 2008, are thinking to go back home.

“EYEWITNESS”

This was my role in Tanzania during the experience I had travelling with CEFA. As the world is very small and what happens in Tanzania has also consequences on my country, I decided to leave for Africa to better understand this situation.

The trip began in the district of **Kilolo**, in the southwest of Tanzania. In this area CEFA, along with the local population, is promoting family farming. The cooperatives have created an agricultural consortium to distribute seeds and to train farmers. They also provide agricultural machinery

with the goal to help people to **stay in their own land and live from it**. Besides CEFA is involved in product marketing, allowing farmers to become small entrepreneurs and sell the surplus to earn some money. As a consequence they could afford to **send their children to school** and to buy what is needed to **live with dignity**.

During the journey, I discovered other important projects. For example, the one that brings electricity to rural **Ikondo**, in the southwest of the country. The electricity can enable Ikondo people to store the food, kids can study in the evenings and adults have the chance to **start small business**, such as the Bomalangombe sawmill.

Going southwards, I was struck by **Njombe** activities. Here Tanzanians have always been breeding cows, one or two for each family, but the zebu, the native race, did not produce enough milk. CEFA intervened with a simple operation: it was sufficient to hybridize the Zebus with the Frisons to improve production **without disturbing the existing model**. The creation of a milk factory was so brilliant to me, because in such a way farmers were supported in their activity from the early stages of production to milk sale.

To sum up, there are not only good intentions but also successful projects.

What conclusion have I drawn from this trip? CEFA wants the rural communities to avoid a terrible disaster: the urbanisation, and this is not a utopia, as in Tanzania, in fact, the **family farming** model has proved to work well and has become a solution to feed the country!



MOZAMBIQUE

“Thank you. Finally, someone came to teach us what we did not know. Now we can sow and from tomorrow onwards we will go to our “machambas” to work the soil.” These are the words of a young woman who took part in the project “Seminiamo per l’Africa” (Let’s sow for Africa). She has learnt how to prepare the mix of sesame seeds and sand, how to mark the soil and to calculate the distance between the seeds. Skills that were unknown to her because, although agriculture in this country employs 80% of the labour-force, it represents a subsistence farming which has to fight every year against droughts, floods and cyclones. Cyclones have devastating impacts not only on crops but also on houses, schools, roads, and on the lives of Mozambican people.

Enhancing agriculture is a necessity that cannot be delayed. Although every kind of intervention is hampered by political instability, especially starting from 2016 when the fight between Frelimo and Renamo, the opposition party which has a strong and rooted popular base, started up again. The escalation of hostilities and armed conflicts has hampered economic and social life and caused the intervention of international mediators. This brought to a ceasefire in December, which is still enduring, and to a hope of new stability.

1 AFRICHAND PROJECT: THE WAY OF MILK

After the success achieved in Tanzania, CEFA has decided to operate also in Mozambique to strengthen the dairy sector. Here, 44% of the population suffers from chronic forms of malnutrition, particularly due to lack of proteins.

Through “The Way of Milk” CEFA wants to support livestock development by improving the skills of Beira district breeders. In this way, they can increase the quantity and improve the quality of milk produced.

Milk and yogurt will limit the effects of malnutrition and a training program will be started up to spread the principles of nutrition and food hygiene through the involvement of local associations. At the same time Cefa aims at improving milk processing methods and developing the market in order to create a sustainable driving force for economics in the long term.

The project tries to enhance the production of **sesame, vegetables and honey** in the area by increasing the skills of small groups of farmers in the district of Caia, in the Sofala province.


Producers are trained and supported from the sowing to the marketing of the products, with the goal of improving their income.

"Here I have experienced a model of development that works, made not of intensive agriculture, but of agriculture and family culture that can enhance what is there."

These are Patrizio Roversi's words who, after traveling and visiting this country together with CEFA, decided to become a testimonial, a witness indeed of the work that is carried out in these territories.

Even in Tanzania, the economy largely depends on agriculture, accounting for 24% of GDP and employing 75% of the workforce. Government's Development and Reduction Programs consider growth in the agricultural and rural economy as a key factor in poverty reduction. In fact, almost 80% of the poor people live in rural areas.

Although there has been an increase in the number of agri-industrial enterprises and medium-sized farms in the last few years, the sector is characterized by family subsistence agriculture.

1 ENERGY IS LIFE

In 7 villages in the Ikondo-Matembwe area, CEFA has started production and distribution of electricity to households, companies and public service providers (nursery, schools and offices). Today there are **55 km of medium voltage line** and 14 cabins that convert the energy into low voltage. CEFA brings the power supply to the transformation cabs where every user can connect. And to help individual users connect, we have set up a microcredit system that provides in advance 50% of the total expenditure.

2 SUSTAINABILITY AND FOOD SAFETY

Since 2010, CEFA promotes food safety in the district of Kilolo. In 2016 training was the most important task: because of this Cefa developed seminars on livestock farming, sustainable agriculture and new technologies applied to agriculture. The second phase of the project has also concerned the distribution of small animals for family and garden kits to help improve **food quality** and increase revenue for peasant families.

CEFA also supports the Agricultural and Veterinary School, created by Mawaki, the only one in the area, through scholarships, laboratory facilities, and the purchase of greenhouses for experimental field trials.

KENYA

When a Kenyan arrives in Italy, he usually becomes stunned and asks: "But are there only old people here? Where are the children around?" Indeed, the gap between the two countries, demographically, is brought to extremes. In Kenya, children are everywhere. When you are travelling with local transports it is easy to find some of them close to you, always asking: "How are u?"

The presence of a young population is an opportunity for the country, but also a serious problem for employment and society, which is facing a fast and unregulated economic growth. The new wealth has obviously created tensions; in fact, also the population in prisons is extremely young and is almost exclusively composed of individuals among the poorest classes. Many children spend long periods of detention waiting to be judged and often convicted of having committed small offenses, almost always linked to a situation of economic disadvantage.

1 WATER AND SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE


Thanks to the Sand Dams (dams built in the sandy river beds), distances to be covered have decreased and the quantity and **quality of water has improved** to the benefit of farmers and of the population of Kitui County. The management of the dams has been given to the beneficiaries, who have been subdivided into working groups.

Local farmers have been trained on **conservative agriculture** techniques which limit the destructive impact on the environment and don't impoverish the soil. Honey production has started and modern beekeeping techniques have been used. In this regard, trade committees have been organized and a has been selected a representative for each group that received specific training on marketing issues.

2 MINORS AND JUSTICE

The project is part of a CEFA long commitment to protect the rights of minors in Kenya. The structural reform of the justice system has been worked out, with the aim of **opposing to the violence against children**, protecting their rights and creating a system free from abuses and violence. The professional skills of those working in the juvenile justice system have been strengthened.

The aim was to improve legal and psychological assistance, **increase educational and rehabilitation services** and the control on juvenile violence within the justice system.



3 PRISONS AND HUMAN RIGHTS

The project helps eliminate **abuses** within the corrective structures. The action is based on three main steps:

- 1) Training of the criminal justice system staff (penitentiary and police officers) and of the detainees on human rights regulations and rights awareness
- 2) Creation of a monitoring system for violations of the rights of persons in correctional structures
- 3) Regulation of the justice system and criminal detention in Kenya.



4 A SECOND CHANCE

At Cafasso's St. Joseph reintegration centre, CEFA wants to give new opportunities to young ex-prisoners that have experienced in their past drugs, acts of violence and abuses.

The project involves the support of young people in educational and professional training, providing psychological aid and **reintegration into families** and communities of origin. In addition, it is planned to develop professional activities through microcredit. Beneficiaries are also taught how to cultivate vegetables, in the greenhouse and in the soil, and to raise cows, chickens and rabbits.



SOMALIA

Insecurity is the most widespread feeling: as a matter of fact even the access to the country is limited, also to humanitarian personnel. Millions of people continue to live in poverty and malnutrition. The lack of clean water causes the spread of Cholera.

Besides, after more than two decades of civil war, living conditions are very difficult: access to water, food, healthcare and education is unattainable for many Somalis. And nowadays, the high presence of refugees coming from bordering countries like Kenya, Ethiopia and Yemen has exacerbated access to resources, which were already scarce.

1 SESAME PRODUCES INCOME

In the districts of Jowhar and Balad the project has boosted agricultural production, created new jobs and improved household income. CEFA has intervened in sesame process, from cultivation to sale, and finally to export.

It has supported farmers by involving them in the cultivation of experimental field with different sesame varieties to test production capacity and **identify the best seeds**. In addition, training courses have been organized to improve production techniques.

Here are some of the oldest proofs of the presence of man on earth.

Today it is a true mosaic of peoples, ethnicities, languages, cultures and landscapes. But in recent years, climate change has heavily hit the country that has faced unsustainable periods of drought, followed by floods and floods. Hostile atmospheric phenomena have bowed the economy, largely supported by the agricultural sector and pushed thousands of peasants to seek shelter in the city, creating an intolerable inurbation.

CEFA will be present in 100 villages in the Wolaita area, one of the poorest and most populous areas of the country with the aim of providing education and employment to make migration a voluntary and uncompromising choice. We want to create opportunities for small farmers, taking care of the conditions of women and young people.

The idea that CEFA pursues in all the countries in which it is involved is to contribute to the growth of a sustainable local economy and to improve the living conditions of the whole community.

MOROCCO

Morocco known as a land of emigration, in recent years has begun to welcome migrants who are no longer just passing through, but are interested in starting a new life within its borders. The integration of these new people full of hope is difficult, because of a labour market that does not integrate new arrivals, a school system that cannot cope with language barriers and the existence of a hard bundle of stereotypes that do not facilitate the acceptance of new cultures.

CEFA intervenes on a day by day basis to make this challenge more possible to be achieved, by developing a close collaboration with local realities.



1 INTEGRATION AND RESPECT

In the areas of Rabat-Salé, Nador-Oujda and Tangier-Touhou, the AI Wassit project aims at strengthening local associations on the issue of **integration and assistance to migrants**.

The project began last year with interactive meetings, debates and seminars on the respect for other cultures and on the importance of living together.

In the coming months, more than 20 social media professionals will be trained on the use of **ethical communication on migration**. 6 INTEGRATION AFTER THE RETURN

TUNISIA

Since 2012, CEFA supports the Tunisian civil society in the delicate phase of democratic transition that the country is experiencing after the 2011 revolution. It concentrated its work in some of the most remote areas of the country. They are remote and marginal areas due to a systematic and conscientious exclusion from governmental development plans. This exclusion over time has enhanced the differences between the inland territories and the coastal areas, between the suburbs and the city centre, more and more evident in terms of access to work, infrastructure and services. The terrorist attacks of these years have also contributed to divert foreign tourists and investors.

Although we are far from achieving full human rights protection, some positive signals come from the independent "Truth and Justice" institution, which intends to clarify abuses and violations during the Bourghiba (1957-1987) and Ben Ali (1987-2011) regimes, through public hearings. In addition, civil society continues in the struggle for the extension of rights. The expulsion of dictator Ben Ali, although not representing a point of arrival, certainly represents a starting point.



1 GABES AGAINST POLLUTION

3 MORE POWER TO MUNICIPAL POLICIES

GUATEMALA

“Now we have a voice, we can express ourselves, we know our rights. Our moms and grandmothers have suffered many acts of violence, and even though this phenomenon has not yet been totally uprooted, it has certainly diminished thanks to the increasing awareness of our rights and to the courage to break the silence we have acquired working with CEFA. I am sure that the change will be more and more evident, that women of future generations will be less and less victims of violence and their voice will grow stronger and firmer against any abuses, thanks to the example of their mothers who have found the courage to say stop.”

These are Tomasa’s words, one of the young beneficiaries of the projects that CEFA has been carrying out in Guatemala for more than 15 years, in the western region of Quiché. Guatemalan society is strongly male oriented, especially in rural areas where indigenous women, despite being the pillar of the community and the point of reference for the family, are relegated to an inferiority state. Maya women are great workers, but they do not receive any compensations for their activities from sunrise to sunset. These women are strong and have a great dignity although they have been living in a context of deep physical, psychological, sexual and economic violence since they were children. Their right of access to study is often not respected and they are forced to marry when they are very young and to give up their ambitions. But the situation is changing.



NEW LIFE TO COCOA AND COFFEE

The project has improved the application of an integrated and sustainable agricultural systems. Fundamental has been the identification of **more resistant cocoa plants** to climate conditions and the application of more efficient agricultural techniques. The productivity of coffee and cocoa has increased by 25% compared to 2015.

The Amazonian Association Marketing Network, supported by the EU and the CEI (Italian Episcopal Conference), has been strengthened thanks to the increase in production and the improvement of quality, together with the farmers of the Sucumbios area. The network has improved access to the local and international market, ensuring direct participation of small producers in bargaining and selling mechanisms.







THE RESTYLING OF THE LOGO, THE WILL TO BE EQUALLY ABLE WITH BOTH HANDS

The colour of the soil, red, African red: here is what we choose to make the logo more efficient. We have turned to this particular red, which means emergency, making it dirty with land. A peculiar colour for the non-profit, a shade which means sustainability. A colour that indicates CEFA's work: agriculture, commitment, food self-sufficiency and respect for the fundamental rights. While the white colour of the character means the way in which CEFA works: with sobriety, transparency, objective clearness. The choice of these two colours is an original solution. Nothing to do with the usual blue-sky colour used generally for solidarity (see UN agencies), nothing to do with the usual red which always recalls to emergency, neither with green which indicates what is natural and healthy. This is a distinctive choice, like the CEFA model.

And then? We played by ambidextrous. Like in the water polo where you do exercises to learn the use of both arms! Being ambidextrous is an advantage, a winning prerogative. If the golem is ambidextrous he is stronger and favoured. And in thinking of restyling the logo, besides the impact and

the effectiveness, we have reasoned as a golem. We tried to use both hands thinking of today, knowing however that there is a little part of yesterday and a bit of tomorrow in it.

In the previous logo, there was a handshake. Now the hands not only shrink but release energy. These hands are stronger, they have the strength of those who know how to use both of them. The world and the handshake were efficient in the 1980s because they aimed at joining the North and South of the World. Today, in a global world, they become arms joining together for working together. These hands are shaking in a challenging way and above the horizon there is a hill, a territory and they want to communicate that CEFA is there, works and is efficient.

An effective and cool change that keeps a strong bond with history but in the same time, it keeps up-date and looks ahead in the logo and colours.

Have we played ambidextrous? Of course, using both arms as you do in many sports and even when you are working seriously. With the awareness that efforts should not be halved but doubled.

1972

Giovanni Bersani: Senator, European politician, a man able to anticipate the times and avoid wars, a friend of many notable persons in the world: he founds CEFA, a Non-Governmental Organization for Voluntary Service and Cooperation.

1973-74

CEFA starts working in Tanzania, in the province of Iringa, requested by the President of the Tanzanian Republic, Julius Nyerere. This is CEFA's first **integrated rural development** project, with the idea of interacting with territory, population, activities and institutions.

1975-80

In these years, CEFA focuses on initiatives in the East African region, especially in Tanzania and Kenya, promoting the responsible participation of local communities.

1992

After the tragic events in Africa and the **Balkans**, CEFA agrees to get in touch and face new situations by intervening in **Somalia, Albania and the territories of former Yugoslavia** (Bosnia and Herzegovina) with agricultural development projects to provide work to the population.

1998

With a particular attention to the



problems of the **Mediterranean area and immigration**, CEFA opens its first agri-zootechnical and social program in Morocco, in the area from where most of the Moroccans immigrated to Italy come.

2000-2001

At the beginning of the new millennium, started the first projects with the Mayan populations of Quiché, Guatemala.

2007

In Tanzania, **Njombe's dairy** is inaugurated, an important dairy product project in the south of the country. In 2015, the **Africa Milk Project was awarded by EXPO Milan 2015 as Best Practice Worldwide** in the category: "Sustainable development among rural communities in marginal areas".

2010-2011


The Arab spring and the intense phenomena of the Mediterranean crisis push CEFA to launch programs in Tunisia, the only democracy in North Africa after a history of dictatorship; a country where it is possible and vital to support civil society.

2015

After the success of the Africa Milk Project in Tanzania, awarded by EXPO Milan, we decided to work in Mozambique to strengthen the milk dairy sector.

2016

Start the first activities in **Ethiopia**, a country that in recent years has been brought to its knees by famine and drought. CEFA is applying agricultural techniques that can make farmers and their land resistant to climate change.

EDUCATION TO WORLD CITIZENSHIP

“Only one World, Only one Future. Educating on Citizenship at School” was the project that played the main role in 2016.

It started in 2015 at a national level and then **activated in 45 schools** in Bologna, Palermo and Trapani. The opportunity to make schools and territory work together **has emerged in all its importance during the activities that animated the “School Week of International Cooperation”**, wanted by MAAEE (Ministry of Foreign Affairs) and MIUR (Ministry of Education, University and Research) which took place from the 22nd to the 28th February. Thanks to the collaboration with CEFA, schools have been organizing initiatives also with the participation of families and representatives of local authorities.

The activities have helped to go deeper into the central topics of the children’s training path, using innovative and interdisciplinary tools and languages. Meetings with young migrants, arrived in Sicily in the dramatic ways we unfortunately observe every day, were promoted; it deals with meetings with co-operation experts, debates on food waste and theatre and didactic workshops on human rights.

The importance of working with the territories has been underlined by some projects that have helped to strengthen the network of partners with which to promote an idea of conscious and active citizenship. It is within this context that projects such as “MigraLab” have been placed together with the municipality of Ravenna and a group of students of the city; public initiatives such as “InFestival” in Bazzano (BO) and “Bo- Afrique” in Bologna, all organized in collaboration with the Cantieri Meticci Association and finally a series of meeting called the “Century of Exodus”, dedicated to the phenomena underlying the migration process, organized in collaboration with Centro Unipol Bologna.



